Funding for Title I would be cut by \$693.5 million in fiscal year 2011 from current levels, which would reduce or eliminate additional academic support for more than 957,000 low-income students; and could lead to more than 9,000 job losses.

Funding for programs administered by the U.S. Department of Education would be cut by almost \$10.6 billion, or 15.3 percent, in fiscal year 2011 below the current CR, affecting millions of students and leading to potentially significant job losses for teachers and other school employees.

Funding for Head Start would be cut by \$1.083 billion in fiscal year 2011 from current levels, which would eliminate almost 128,000 enrollment slots for low-income children; and could lead to almost 14,600 job losses.
