The Congress is currently operating under a continuing resolution (CR) until March 4, 2011, which funds most federal programs at the fiscal year 2010 level but includes \$5.7 billion to cover the shortfall in the Federal Pell Grants program. On February 19, 2011, the House approved a Continuing Resolution, H.R. 1, with amendments, to fund the federal government for the last seven months of the fiscal year. H.R. 1 contains deep funding cuts to non-security discretionary spending. (Discretionary spending is subject to the annual appropriations process. Non-security spending excludes defense, veterans programs, and homeland security). Federal education-related programs fall under this category. Funding for programs administered by the U.S. Department of Education would be cut by \$11.56 billion, or 16.5 percent, in fiscal year 2011 below the current CR, affecting millions of students and leading to potentially significant job losses for teachers and other school employees.
