Under the No Child Left Behind Act, the latest version of ESEA, the federal government has failed to fund Title I, Part A at either the appropriation ceiling set in law or the maximum basic grant level as authorized. Today, the annual funding gap is almost \$11 billion and \$23 billion, respectively.
