

ORGANIZING FOR OPPORTUNITY:

What Educators Need To Know



Why did we launch My School, My Voice?

Education is our calling, and nobody knows better than us how to meet students' needs. All schools should provide community support services like nutrition, health, and after-school programs for students who need it. As a group, we are helping educators, parents and community members push policymakers to focus on everything a student needs to succeed - not just test scores. Without pressure from us, school districts could privatize or make cuts that negatively affect some of our most vulnerable students.

We launched the My School, My Voice campaign to demand transparency and inclusion in the school improvement planning process. While the new law requires states to involve local stakeholders, we wanted to create a place where educators and the community could come together as a team to advance the needs of students and schools.

Who should get involved?

Anyone who cares about quality public education can join our campaign to improve our local schools. As educators, we have a unique role because we have the experience and expertise to make the school and classroom decisions that lead to student success.

What are we asking for?

We are asking local school districts to collaborate with us to create student-centered improvement plans. If we are organized, we can make sure schools develop plans that emphasize providing all students with the learning opportunities and support services—such as before-care and after-care—that they deserve, regardless of where they live.

What does participating in this campaign mean?

Getting active in this campaign is simple. Just talk with your colleagues, parents and community members about building a vision for a better public school. Ask them to start by completing the **Opportunity Checklist**; a short, research- and criteria-based survey to help you identify your school's gaps and needs. DESCRIBE THE OPPORTUNITY
