KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



BECKY PRINGLE

President, National Education Association

NEA President Becky Pringle is a fierce social justice warrior, defender of educator rights, an unrelenting advocate for all students and communities of color, and a valued and respected voice in the education arena. A middle school science teacher with 31 years of classroom experience, Becky was elected in 2020 as COVID-19 ravaged Black, Brown and indigenous communities nationwide. Her vision is to unite NEA and the nation and then use that collective power to lead a movement to reclaim public education as a common good—as the foundation of U.S. democracy—and transform it into something it was never intended to be: a racially and socially just and equitable system designed to prepare every student to succeed in a diverse and interdependent world.

Becky is a staunch advocate for students who have disabilities, identify as LGBTQ+, are immigrants, or English Language Learners. Before assuming NEA's top post, she served as NEA vice president. She directed NEA's work to combat institutional racism, and spotlight systemic patterns of racism and educational injustice that impact students. Under Becky's guidance, NEA works to widen access and opportunity by demanding changes to policies, programs, and practices.

Becky's extensive record of Association advocacy spans the national, state, and local levels. She is a former local president, served on the Board of Directors for NEA and the Pennsylvania State Education Association, was a two-term member of NEA's Executive Committee, and also held the NEA secretary-treasurer position.



PRINCESS MOSS

Vice President, National Education Association

Princess Moss, an elementary school music teacher from Louisa County, Va., is the vice president of the National Education Association, the nation's largest professional organization.

A champion of children and public education at the local, state, and national levels, Moss served as secretary-treasurer from 2014 through 2020. Prior to this, she distinguished herself with two terms on the NEA Executive Committee, where she served on the Elementary and Secondary Education (ESEA) Advisory Committee, steering the Association's strategy for the law's pending reauthorization, and the Dropout Prevention Advisory Committee, helping develop relevant tools for NEA members. Under her direction as president, the

62,000-member Virginia Education Association increased its membership and advocated successfully for greater investment in public education at the state and local levels. She also served as VEA Vice President and on the Board of Directors for NEA and VEA for over 10 years.

The daughter of two school bus drivers, Moss earned her bachelor's degree in music education from the University of Mary Washington, and received the university's Distinguished Alumnus Award in 2006. She also earned a master's degree in elementary and secondary administration and supervision from the University of Virginia.

NOEL CANDELARIA

Secretary-Treasurer, National Education Association

Noel Candelaria is the Immediate Past President of the Texas State Teachers Association (TSTA), the state affiliate of the National Education Association (NEA). Prior to his election as TSTA President, Noel served as TSTA Vice President after a distinguished tenure as President of the Ysleta Teachers Association (YTA) in El Paso, Texas, where he worked as a Teacher's Aide and Special Education Teacher in the Ysleta Independent School District (YISD).

Noel and his wife Patty, who is a National Board-Certified teacher, are tireless advocates committed to the success of every student. Throughout his career, Noel has emphasized the importance of relationships built on trust. He believes our public schools must provide

every student the best opportunity to fulfill their individual potential.

Noel also serves as Treasurer on the board of the National Teachers Hall of Fame (NTHF) and while acting as the chair of the Memorial to Fallen Educators, legislation was passed to designate the monument as a National Memorial site.

Noel has served on multiple national committees and task forces including the NEA Human and Civil Rights Committee and the NEA Member Benefits Corporation Board. He has also been asked to be a speaker at several national conferences on various topics including Racial and Social Justice.

As a son of hard-working immigrants, the importance of education and the opportunities that a quality public education can provide were core values instilled in him. Noel is grateful and honored to be an advocate for students and educators in the meaningful work of ensuring those opportunities are always available for others.



PEDRO NOGUERA, PhD

Dean of the Rossier School of Education, University of Southern California

Pedro Noguera is the Emery Stoops and Joyce King Stoops Dean of the Rossier School of Education and a Distinguished Professor of Education at the University of Southern California. Prior to joining USC, Noguera served as a Distinguished Professor of Education at the Graduate School of Education and Information Studies at the University of California, Los Angeles. Before joining the faculty at UCLA, he served as a tenured professor and holder of endowed chairs at New York University, Harvard University and the University of California, Berkeley.

He is the author of 15 books. His most recent books are A Search for Common Ground:

Conversations About the Toughest Questions in K-12 Education (Teachers College Press) with Rick Hess, and City Schools and the American Dream: Still Pursuing the Dream (Teachers College Press) with Esa Syeed.

The ESP Professional Growth Continuum (PGC) serves as a "map" for ESPs to grow professionally in eight universal standards

- 1. **Communication** Standard: ability to effectively listen and communicate (written and verbal) with a diverse audience including students, parents/guardians, staff, visitors, and community
- 2. **Cultural Competence** Standard: ability to examine one's own cultural context, understand cultural contexts of others, and interact across cultural contexts with sensitivity to differences (e.g., economic, race, gender, and disability)
- 3. Organization Standard: ability to prioritize, plan, and execute tasks efficiently and effectively
- 4. **Reporting** Standard: ability to understand the responsibilities of a mandated reporter and what, when, how, and to whom reports should be filed
- 5. **Ethics** Standard: ability to maintain a high level of ethical behavior, confidentiality, and privacy of any information regarding students, staff, and all job-related matters
- 6. Health & Safety Standard: ability to protect the health and safety of oneself and others by knowing and executing health, safety, and emergency protocols/procedures with fidelity
- 7. **Technology** Standard: ability to use electronic devices to problem solve and complete work-related duties
- 8. **Professionalism** Standard: ability to present and conduct oneself in a professional manner in all job settings

How can ESPs manage and prevent challenging behaviors in the classroom, on the school bus, and in other school environments while promoting a positive school climate and social, emotional, and academic development (SEAD)? According to recent research, one in five children today have experienced at least one traumatic event in their life. One could argue that currently 100% of our children are experiencing trauma due to COVID-19. These experiences, coupled with the understanding that all children perform better academically when they have strong social and emotional skills, underscores the need for learning the principles of behavior. This workshop will address universal practices for providing positive behavioral supports and specialized intervention strategies that address challenging behaviors and promote safe and supportive learning environments for students. They will learn and practice research-based strategies for positive behavior change by working through real-life scenarios. This workshop is relevant for all ESP career families.

This session will provide an overview of eligibility requirements and tips on how to write successful grant proposals, as well as feature outstanding ESP projects that have been funded by the NEA Foundation and the NEA's Center for Great Public Schools. The goal is to reduce and ultimately eliminate discriminatory behaviors that can lead to racial and social injustices and inequalities.

During this interactive training, NEA field staff will help participants develop and implement effective use of POST including next steps and how to create a plan of action. They will also cover basic roll out, providing form emails, SMS messaging, hustle scripts, customized web pages, and other ways of implementing the tool. POST is a mobile friendly web form connected to NEA's membership database, NEA 360. The tool aggregates data on a local and national level, sends back regular reports to local leaders and staff, and facilitates an individual's participation in the larger project of promoting public safety through organizing in their union.

In order to be able to recognize the warning signs, all ESPs need training to acquire the skills, vocabulary, and techniques to support young people at risk. In this workshop, participants will gain an understanding of the importance of suicide prevention training as well as learn how to recognize and identify the risks and warning signs for youth suicide. Through interactive role-plays, participants will gain practical knowledge and skills to be able to respond to a young person at risk. The Massachusetts Department of Public Health's Suicide Prevention Program's online training, "The "S" Word: The Role of Schools in Preventing Suicide," will also be discussed.

Sometimes the language we use to explain school practices and goals to families is complicated and full of educational jargon and acronyms. Families often find the words and authoritative tone we use off-putting, confusing and alienating. They are often overwhelmed with the amount of information we are providing, which can cause them to disengage and tune us out. Simplifying and improving our communication skills can eliminate barriers and allow us to fully engage with families as equal partners. Participants will leave with practical tips, tools, and techniques they can apply to all of their conversations, emails, text messages, and newsletters.

This session will discuss triggers (antecedents) that lead to challenging behavior. We will use the five tenets of the whole student philosophy: Healthy, Safe, Supported, Engaged, Challenged, and share how each of these tenets can impact student behavior.


