ADVANTAGES OF BUILDING COALITIONS

- Building and participating in coalitions is a critical component of advocacy.
- Coalitions are important for groups that don't have the capacity to do the work on their own.
- By teaming up with other organizations, smaller organizations can pool resources, reach more policymakers, and more efficiently and effectively make changes.



WHY BUILD A COALITION?

- Strength in numbers. A coalition brings together diverse groups that share a common goal. By working together, coalition members can increase and expand their influence and make a stronger case for policy change among different audiences.
- Expand resources, expertise, and capacity. Coalition members bring different skills, knowledge and expertise to the effort. By sharing resources and collaborating, the coalition. Can develop a more comprehensive and effective strategy for achieving its goal.



WHY BUILD A COALITION?

- Increased visibility and collective action. A coalition can generate more visibility and more media coverage than a single organization.
- Heightened political clout. When a coalition represents a broad and diverse range stakeholders, decision-makers are more likely to take their concerns seriously.



HOW WE ESTABLISHED A COALITION IN SOUTH CAROLINA

- We identified an issue Book banning
- We identified groups who were concerned with the issue (Inclusiveness):
 - ACLU
 - League of Women Voters
 - NAACP
 - Talk show host
 - Richland County Democratic Party
 - Community activists

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HOW WE ESTABLISHED A COALITION IN SOUTH CAROLINA

- We met at SCEA-R headquarters
- Each participant had the opportunity to express concerns
- The participants suggested possible courses of action
- Participants were responsible for notifying their members of actions to take
