

A Snapshot of who Got Cut at ED on March 11


The number of employees who received notification they were being put on leave.







Access, Influence, and Authority)








NEA was the only association that improved its reputation with Republicans and Democrats in 2024

Republicans valued the "perspective" and "credibility" of NEA's members, whose engagement drove further improvements in NEA's grassroots advocacy effectiveness (in absolute terms and relative to other progressive groups)

Secretary of Education Linda McMahon

- Linda McMahon is a billionaire with **no significant background in education**, nor any understanding of what it takes to help students thrive.
- Spent most of her career as CEO of World Wrestling Entertainment, a company accused of shady business practices and abusive treatment of employees.
- During her confirmation hearing she shared actions to carry out the Project 2025 plan and suggested measures to enact despite lack of congressional approval.
 - The Department of Education is NOT a national school board. Nor does it control the power of the purse—<u>that is the role of Congress</u>.
- Secretary of Education is not a "learn on the job" position

What is Reconciliation?

- ✓ "Reconciliation" is a budget process used nowadays to pass partisan legislation.
- ✓ Generally, because of the **filibuster**, it takes 60 votes to pass a bill in the Senate—but not a reconciliation bill.
- ✓ Reconciliation plays by special rules that require only a simple majority—51 votes instead of the usual 60, or just 50 votes when the vice president is of the same party as the majority.
- ✓ The reconciliation process begins with each chamber passing an identical budget "resolution" that is not law and not signed by the president.
- ✓ The budget resolution contains **reconciliation instructions** that direct some committees to achieve certain budgetary effects over a specified period of time. Committees then write legislation consistent with the instructions.
- ✓ Provisions of the reconciliation bill must involve spending, taxes, or both.
- ✓ Generally, the **Senate parliamentarian** decides what stays in the bill and what goes.
- ✓ The reconciliation process cannot be used to cut funding for **Title I or special education**—for that, lawmakers must use the annual budget process called "appropriations."

Reconciliation Timeline



March: House and Senate GOP work to reconcile significant differences in budget resolution to agree on one resolution.



Early April: Optimistic timeframe for the House to vote on reconciled resolution. Senate would follow.



Remainder of April: Committees of jurisdiction craft and vote on the details of what becomes the reconciliation bill.



Early May: Most optimistic timeframe for House and Senate votes on reconciliation bill.



NOTE: Congress usually takes longer than leadership hopes and projects; this could drag out to Memorial Day or even beyond.


Billionaires Don't Need More Giveaways

- Biggest beneficiaries of Tax Cuts and Jobs Act passed during first Trump administration were households with incomes in the top 1 percent.
 Republicans look to extend this.
- Extending provisions of the law that expire at the end of 2025 would cost \$4.3 trillion.
- Over the long term, it is counterproductive to pay for tax cuts for the wealthy and corporations by slashing investments in the students who are our nation's future.

Threats to Higher Education in Reconciliation

The Republican Roadmap - The College Cost & Reduction Act

- Diminish access to postsecondary education
 - Make student loan repayment less affordable
 - Efforts to privatize student lending and reduce the federal role in providing financial assistance
 - More delinquency and default rates
 - Taxes on scholarships
- Hamstring the effectiveness of Public Service Loan Forgiveness (PSLF)
- Remove essential safeguards against proprietary institutions



Limit Federal Role in Student Lending

Capping the total amount of federal student aid a student can receive annually at the "median cost of college."

- \$50,000 for undergraduate students
- \$100,000 for graduate students, and;
- \$150,000 for students in graduate professional programs.
- Other proposals even call to eliminate federal lending all together for graduate and professional student loans.
- Exceptions would be made for programs that demonstrate "strong student outcomes" related to employment and completion

Where NEA stands?

- Any caps on federal borrowing will bar many students in underserved communities from receiving a federal financial aid package sufficient to cover the cost of college.
- Disadvantaged students would resort to private loans, exposing them to higher interest rates and other predatory practices.
- While some proposals provide exceptions to the caps that vary by degree program, we are concerned that the criteria are too focused on potential earnings and discourage students from pursuing careers in public service, such as education.

Hamstring Public Service Loan Forgiveness (PSLF)

PSLF has provided loan forgiveness to more than **1 million** educators, firefighters, police officers, armed service members, nurses, and numerous other public sector workers.

Despite this, Republicans will seek to either end, limit, or hamper the effectiveness of PSLF by:

- 1) Enact a cap to how much can be forgiven under PSLF;
- 2) Make only undergraduate loans be eligible for forgiveness;
- 3) Further limit which professions would be eligible for the program; and
- 4) Reducing the effectiveness of income-driven repayment programs.





Ending Safeguards & Loose Accreditation

- 1) Repeal the 90/10 rule and gainful employment.
 - If they are lifted, for-profit and other proprietary institutions will be free to take even greater advantage of the lower-income students they predominantly serve.
- 2) Eliminate the borrower defense to repayment rule it provides relief to defrauded borrowers if they attended an institution that closed, misled them, or engaged in misconduct.
- 3) Weaken the nation's higher education accreditation system:
 - Requiring an accreditor's board or governing body to have business representation
 - Fast track outsourcing programs
 - Lowering accreditation standards
 - More leeway for struggling or failing programs


