Often our people are the first people families see in the morning and the last people they see in the day.

We get in at 4:30am and don't leave until every bus is back safely. We collaborate with community centers to address bus stop challenges. If a stop needs to be moved, we might arrange for students to wait safely on their property. Building these connections strengthens our community and helps families.







The Metaphor

Just as a space launch relies on a team of people working together to plan and complete a mission, families, schools and communities can work together to launch children's learning.

This involves planning successful learning by collaborating at the stare of the school year.

And when families, schools, and communities work together throughout the year on their shared mission, student learning takes off.

6,000 hours of awake time we all have annually, including children





Report increased job satisfaction and reduced likelihood of leaving the profession.




Provides increased opportunities for all families and more healthy communities

Take part in the broader field and advocate alongside families for systems change to champion equity.




COLLABORATE

Our Process







1. Respect, Honor, and Value Families

a. Examine, respect, and value the cultural and linguistic diversity of families and communities

b. Explore, understand, and honor with families how children develop, grow, and change from birth through adulthood across settings, and how these changes affect families



2. Embrace Equity Throughout Family Engagement

a. Look inward to develop cultural humility, cognitive flexibility, and perspective-taking skills to practice antibias and equitable family and community engagement.

b. Reflect on how history and social context influence family engagement systems and practices.

3. Build Trusting Reciprocal Relationships with Families
